Designed to help travelers keep track of their visits to these regions, *The Traveler's Passport* has an interesting and informative entry for each country with colorful photos, the flag, space to write the date of the visit, and interesting facts like the country's landmass area, population, languages, currency, and important products.

For ease of use, countries and territories are grouped by region and arranged alphabetically. Travelers can also keep track of where they have been by using a highlighter marker to color in locations they have visited on designated map pages. A "Geography of the Caribbean" section illustrates the location and the political status of every country in the Caribbean, including all of the dependencies and independent nations. There is a similar entry for each South and Central American country.
